A Museum/Heritage Centre for Bicester and the formation of a Bicester Museum Trust:

We are pleased to report progress with the campaign to establish a Museum/Heritage Centre in Bicester. Consultations have taken place between representatives of Bicester Local History Society, Oxfordshire Museum Service, Bicester Town Council and Cherwell District Council regarding this project over the past few months. Common ground has been agreed and further developments are awaited. We hope that a small Museum/Heritage facility will be included in the new Civic Centre. Other possible locations could become available in the coming months as government 'Localism Act' legislation is enacted to provide the opportunity for a more substantial Museum/Heritage Centre to be established.

Members of the Bicester Local History Society Committee, local councillors and volunteers have visited Thame Museum on a number of occasions recently to share the experiences that they gained in setting up a local town Museum. The Museum at Thame was set up as a Trust and is run by volunteers. Their model provides an excellent example of what might be achieved in Bicester. Further discussions will take place in the near future to determine the viability of a Trust project locally.





The Garth:

Recent speculation in the media has centred on the future of The Garth. The Town Council is currently considering the future of the iconic building. The roof at the house is in urgent need of repair to make it water tight. Options are under review to fund the repairs. The Garth has long been regarded in high regard by the town residents. Bicester Local History Society is monitoring developments concerning the refurbishment closely and the plans that are being discussed to develop the site. Local Councillors are on record at Town Council meetings as suggesting that The Garth might well become a Museum in the future!

History Walks:

A series of 'Village History Walks' are planned for this year. Walks take place on Sunday afternoons at 2.30 p.m. and are followed by refreshments. The walks will include *Lower Heyford* (10th June), *Brill* (8th July), *Chesterton* (19th August) and *Islip* (16th September). Further details will be made available to Society members when they are finalised.

Bicester Local History Society will be launching a new venture this year with a programme of 'Countryside History Walks'. These will enable those who wish to pursue their interest of the historic landscape to take their interest that little bit further! The walks are structured to complement the 'Village History Walks' and include countryside circuits around *Lower Heyford* (24th June – 3.5 miles), *Brill* (22nd July – 4.5 miles) and *Islip* (7th October – 5 miles). Further details will follow in the near future.



Community Archaeology Conference:

The Council for British Archaeology is to hold their Spring Conference at St Edburg's Church Hall, Bicester at 10.00 a.m. on Saturday 21st April. The Conference is title 'Community Archaeology' and finishes at 4.00 p.m. The event is open to the public and costs £12.00 for non-members of the organisation. Skeleton and Pottery washing at Beckley:

John Moore Heritage Services provided the opportunity for members of the Society to experience hands on archaeological work assisting with bone and pottery washing activities at their Beckley headquarters. Sessions took place on Monday, Tuesday and Friday mornings. A number of our members took part in this activity. Work on the Dorchester-on-Thames bone and pottery washing has drawn to a close.
